Xylitol is Toxic for Dogs!

Does your dog have a sweet tooth? Beware of products containing **xylitol**. It is toxic to dogs. It can cause hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) in dogs, but recent discoveries show that it can cause acute liver disease and a coagulopathy (inability to clot the blood). A study found that 0.5g/kg or more of ingested xylitol can cause liver failure.


What are the signs of xylitol toxicity?

Vomiting is usually the first sign of toxicity and then in 30-60 minutes hypoglycemia can occur. The signs of hypoglycemia can be lethargy, ataxia (stumbling around), collapse, and seizure. In cases where gum with xylitol was ingested, the hypoglycemia may be delayed for up to 12 hours. In severe over doses, some dogs do not display the signs of hypoglycemia prior to the onset of liver failure. Instead lethargy and vomiting occurred 9-72 hours after exposure. They developed petechia (small spots of bleeding on the skin and mucus membranes like gums), echymosis (larger spots of bleeding seen on the skin and mucus membranes), and gastric hemorrhage (bleeding in the stomach).

What can you do if your dog does ingest xylitol?

Immediately bring him into your veterinarian and let him/her know which items contained xylitol. Remember how much your pet consumed (always estimate on the high side because it is always better to be overly cautious when it comes to the health and wellbeing of your faithful friend). Your veterinarian will want to treat your dog with dextrose (a type of sugar) so that they do not go into hypoglycemic shock. They will also treat the pet for liver disease if enough xylitol is ingested.

Xylitol may help you watch your waist line, but it can be deadly to your furry friend. 🐾




Salty is watching for you!


Dear SCMR,






Quick Tips for Flea Control

- Spray microscopic nematodes in moist, shady spots outside — even in flower and vegetable gardens. The worms eat flea larvae and can reduce populations by 90 percent within 24 hours.
- Set eucalyptus leaves inside and out because fleas can't stand the smell. Buy bunches at a craft store, cut them up and place leaves and stems in open glass jars. Set one or two in each room of the house. Also, hang pod-filled socks from branches around the yard.
- Create a specific pet sleeping area that's easy to clean often.
- Vacuum carpeting, furniture and floors weekly. When fleas are present, put a flea collar in the vacuum bag to kill vacuumed up fleas.
- Regularly wash all bedding and rugs that your pet has contact with.
- Sprinkle Diatomaceous Earth around your yard, in pet bedding, under furniture cushions, etc. It is a natural mineral that kills fleas. It can even be dusted on your pets with no harm to them! 🐾

TREATS FOR TRICKS!

Chicken Jerky for Dogs



Ingredients:

1 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breasts 1/4 cup olive oil
Juice of 1 lemon
Optional (to taste): peppermint, rosemary, parsley, turmeric, cinnamon

Directions:

1. Trim away any excess fat and cut chicken into strips, keeping thin and even. 1/8 to 1/4 inches thick;
2. Combine remaining ingredients into a resealing bag such as a Ziploc and add chicken strips;
3. Seal bag, making sure that most of the air is out and rub/mix items in bag to make sure that all of the chicken strips are coated. Marinate overnight;
4. Preheat oven to 300°. Remove chicken from marinade and place evenly into a glass baking dish and bake for 30 minutes. Let chicken cool;
5. Preheat oven to 145°. Transfer cool chicken to a wire rack that is over a baking sheet that has been lined with foil. Place into oven and cook four to six hours until chicken is leathery.
6. Allow chicken to fully cool before giving to your dog. Slice with the grain of the chicken as this will make the final product chewier for your pet. Jerky must be stored in the refrigerator and will last up to three weeks; however, it can be frozen and stored for up to eight months. 🐾
